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Message from the Headteacher

We were delighted to see such a great turnout at our Parent Forum meeting on Monday, which was the best in years. It was especially encouraging to receive positive feedback regarding the weekly newsletter and the newly introduced Class Charts.

There has been a significant increase in the number of pupils trying to attend school wearing leggings this week. **I would like to confirm that pupils are not permitted to wear leggings to school.** If pupils present to school in leggings, we will provide them with alternatives to wear for the day from our uniform store. If pupils will not engage with this, we will contact home and ask parents to bring in appropriate uniform. If neither of these solutions can be actioned then pupils will be placed into reset for the rest of the day. It is of course colder now and the heating has been turned on in school to reflect this. It is also permissible from Monday for pupils to **wear plain black socks over tights** if their feet are cold. White or coloured socks are not permitted.

Our uniform expectations have been reinforced to pupils and parents on multiple occasions since last July. We need to reinforce them consistently and fairly. I would therefore very much appreciate you discussing these rules with your child/children this weekend and ensuring they leave for school dressed in appropriate uniform every day.

I actively encourage our new sixth form students to be looking at the courses they would like to study so that active preparations can be made. We will be having these discussions in the near future.

Health & Wellbeing

This week, we have had a visit from Bethan Jones, an NHS advisor. She came to take Health and Wellbeing lessons with year 8 pupils with a focus on the dangers of vaping.

During the lesson, discussions were had regarding the reasons why there is a rapid rise in the number of young people vaping. Pupils were introduced to a variety of health concerns that are linked to smoking in general and in particular, e cigarettes. It was interesting to discuss how big companies were specifically targeting younger people into buying them by developing a range of fruity flavours and bright packaging. It was shocking to learn that sometimes, the nicotine content of these vapes could be higher than found in regular cigarettes – which will inevitably lead to a rise in nicotine addiction. This is especially worrying as it meant that children who are exposed to vaping are developing nicotine addictions at an even earlier age. As a class, discussions were had about the fact that research has not yet been done on the long term impact of vaping and pupils offered a range of ways in which we could tackle the problem: even suggesting that vapes should be only available by prescription to adults who were trying to quit smoking.

Remember, it is illegal for adults to buy vapes on behalf of under-18s. Those selling or suspected of selling either nicotine vapes or tobacco products to under-18s can be reported anonymously to 'No Ifs. No Butts'.

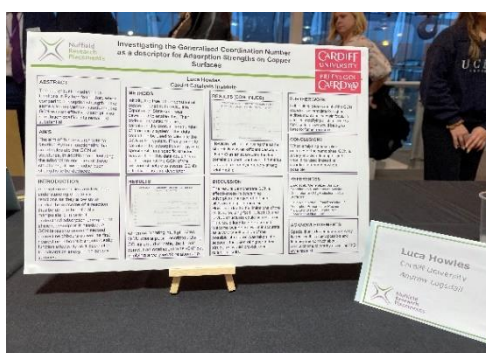
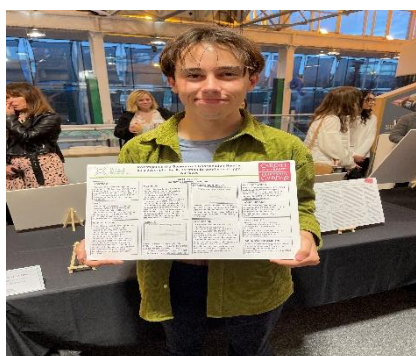


Science

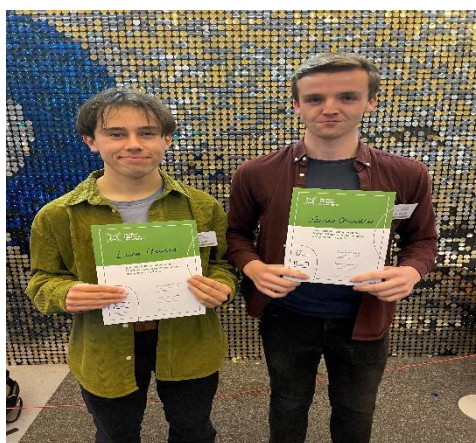
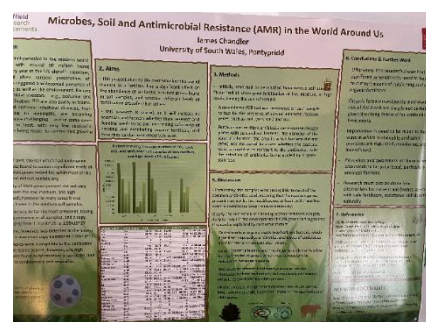

Luca worked at Cardiff University investigating the generalised coordination number as a descriptor for adsorption strengths on copper surfaces.

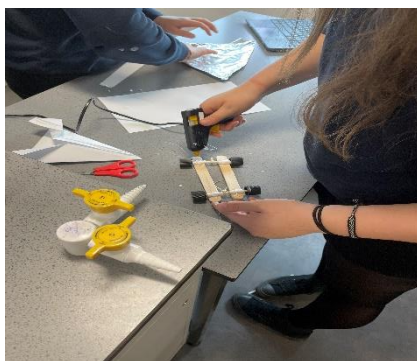


Jamie worked at the University of South Wales investigating microbes, soil and antimicrobial (AMR) in the world around us.

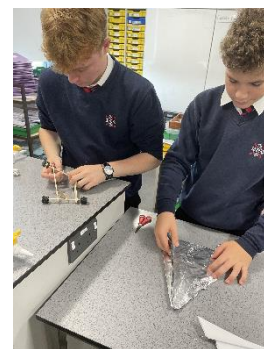


Well done on your amazing achievements – Da iawn!

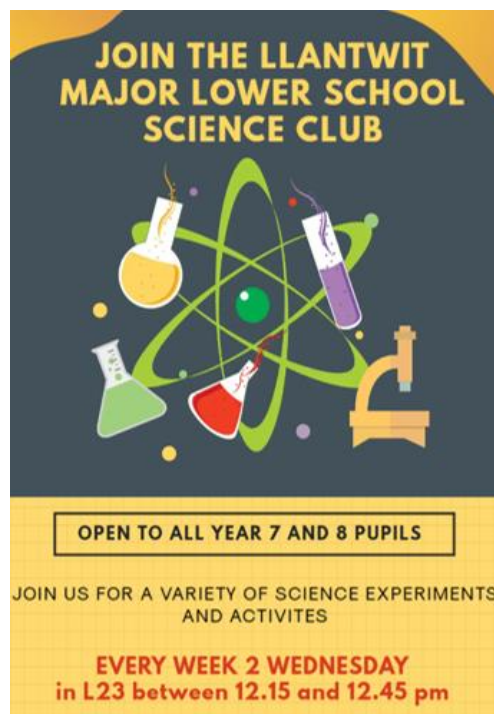

Contacting School

Please refrain from telephoning the school, other than for urgent purposes. For all general enquiries please email llantwitmajorhs@valeofglamorgan.gov.uk. **Please be reminded that we operate an appointments only system for meeting with parents and if you present at school requesting an immediate appointment we will not be able to accommodate you.**

Forgotten Items

We can no longer accept the delivery of forgotten items such as PE kit, books, lunch boxes etc. during the school day. Please ensure your child arrives at school with the equipment needed for the day. In the exceptional case that you do need to bring an item into school for your child, you will be asked to leave it on the desk in the main entrance. This is to reduce traffic on to the school site and ensure student safety during lesson transitions.

Medication

Please note we **do not** stock medication of any kind in school, including paracetamol, and we are not allowed to dispense medication without parental consent. If your child receives prescribed medication a medical form, available from main Reception to be collected by your son/daughter, will be required to be completed and returned to Reception. Should your child need medication throughout the school day please ensure they bring just what is needed for the day to school with them.
